**Our Worship is Changing**

The *May Worship Schedule* is different from other schedules which have been previously sent or posted. You will notice that each Sunday is listed, followed by how it is counted in the Easter season. You will see our *Scriptures*: a Psalm, an Epistle reading, and a Gospel selection, followed by the *Title* of the sermon or reflection for each week.

You will, no doubt, notice what is not listed - - **Music!** This is because we have a *Music Committee* selecting music for our virtual worship time on Zoom, where music selection was left to the pastor in conjunction with the music director previously.

You will also notice there is a *Thursday, May 21<sup>st</sup>, 6:30 p.m.* worship time for *Ascension Day*. Normally, “*The Brown Church*” does not celebrate *Ascension Day*, as our congregation only assembles each Sunday. Now, with virtual presentations, anyone who would like can “Zoom in” to the service that evening. Hopefully, some of you will avail yourselves to this opportunity, assuming we are still quarantined.

*Bible Study* will continue on Zoom, each Friday morning at **9:00 a.m.** Each class will look at the Bible passages for the upcoming Sunday. This is a joint male/female Bible Study during our time of quarantine - - link will be sent by email prior to each meeting.

I personally want to thank everyone for being understanding, as we have experienced ‘glitches’ using the Zoom platform. Each week, the entry codes must change to prevent “bombing” of Zoom meetings. Everything is changing (*and changing quickly!*) so it takes extra effort to stay in front of the demands placed on our church. We have a wonderful “*tech staff*” working to ensure our time together at worship is secure.





## HISTORY CORNER

### Dr. Chester M. Wiggin: Pillar of Conway Village Congregational: #4 in series

Many long time natives will remember the imposing house of the Doctor's family right on Main Street across from the old Majestic Theatre and the Bolduc Block. It was sadly razed in 1969 for a new post office and is today's physical therapy establishment operated by Betsy Donovan. Let us explore the personage of the good doctor who could see his church from his home.

Chester McLoon Wiggin was actually from Maine - South Thomaston to be exact. The son of Charles M. and Elvira (Stanton) he was born there on July 15, 1881 and educated at local schools and at Bucksport Seminary where he graduated in 1902. He matriculated two years at Bowdoin before beginning the study of medicine at the University of Vermont in Burlington, gaining his degree in 1906. He started his practice in Stonington in 1907 before moving to Conway in 1909. He became one of the most popular physicians in Carroll County and was a long time surgeon in North Conway. According to Janet Hounsell's book, Dr. Wiggin and Doc Snow in the early years stayed for some time at a so-called pest house somewhere on the West Side Road because of the smallpox epidemic. A woman who was a noncarrier of the disease cooked for the patients and the staff as a quarantine sign was posted on the door. In 1917, Dr. Wiggin and Dr. Frank Horne announced new fees "made necessary for rising expenses." From February 1st on, office calls with medications extra, were to cost the patients 75 cents. House calls within a mile of the office would cost \$1.25. If called between 7:00 PM and 6 A.M. the cost would be \$2.00. An added charge of 33 1/3 cents would be charged for each additional mile.

During World War I, Dr. Wiggin served as a Captain in the United States Medical Corps, stationed at one of the Southern camps. He was an active member of the community and was a member of the Mount Washington Lodge of Masons; Signet Chapter, Royal Arch Masons; Odd Fellows; Knights of Pythias; Conway Men's Club; NH State Medical Society serving as Vice-President and the Republican Party. His son, Chester, once served on Senator Norris Cotton's staff and once ran for Congress. He tragically died in the Logan Airport crash that took several Conway lives back in 1974. (It was he, a very distant cousin, who was largely responsible for obtaining a job for me in the Senate Cloak-room while I attended American University Graduate School)

The doctor married in Hampton on October 22, 1908 to Frances Starkey. She was an active member of the Women's Group at our Second Congregational Church. They went on to have two sons, Bruce (who was the first Kennett Cup recipient, and the aforementioned Chester. All three doctors in the village when I was growing up were affiliated with our church: Dr. Smith, Dr. Spring, and Dr. Wiggin. These professionals attended services when possible, but all were frequently out on house calls.

Dr. Wiggin enjoyed the respect and confidence of all who knew him. This included my family. It was he who stayed with my twelve-year-old Uncle Raymond, after a skiing accident. He and Vernon Smith were skiing on a steep hill on the West Side not aware of a fence being pulled across its base since their last run. Raymond stuck his homemade ski poles in front of him startled by the new discovery. The pole lodged in his chest in the major blood vessel. Dr. Wiggin was called up, but death was inevitable. His was the first ski fatality in town. His last words to his grieving mother was, "Mama - it is getting so dark out." Imagine all of the joys and tragedies the good doctor witnessed during his practice!

We are also so blessed to have new technologies like Zoom, so that we can worship together and see the faces and hear the voices of people we are missing. It is certainly helping us to worship God in a community setting once again. It's definitely the highlight of my week!

May is the month that Christians across the world will celebrate Christ's Ascension, remembering the day that Christ ascended into heaven-the 40<sup>th</sup> day of Easter, Thursday May 21<sup>st</sup> this year. The birth of Christ's church-Pentecost, the 50<sup>th</sup> day of Easter, May 31, celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and the other early followers of Jesus. It also recognizes the day that the church was established.

Jesus promised this in **John 14: 16-17**. **"And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor (or Comforter, Encourager, or Advocate), who will never leave you. He is the Holy Spirit, who leads into all truth. The world at large cannot receive him, because it isn't looking for him and doesn't recognize him. But you do, because he lives with you now and later will be in you."**

In Acts 1: 4-5 he reminds them again: **In one of these meetings as he was eating a meal with them, he told them, "do not leave Jerusalem until the Father sends you what he promised. Remember, I have told you about this before. John baptized with water, but in just a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."**

**The Holy Spirit Comes Acts 2: 1—7, 11-12** **On the day of Pentecost, seven weeks after Jesus' resurrection, the believers were meeting together in one place. Suddenly, there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm in the skies above them, and it filled the house where they were meeting. Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each of them. And everyone present was filled with Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages, as the Holy Spirit gave them this ability.**

**Godly Jews from many nations were living in Jerusalem at that time. When they heard this sound, they came running to see what it was all about, and they were bewildered to hear their own languages being spoken by the believers. They were beside themselves with wonder. "How can this be?" they exclaimed. 'These people are from Galilee'.**
