A Year of Challenges

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not yet seen." Hebrews 11:1

2024 has been "A Year of Challenges". On Monday, December 18, 2023, when the flood waters breached our church, the destruction was sudden and overwhelming. The chaos that resulted put a halt to our developing programs as well as to our established missions to the greater Mount Washington Valley. The church was always faithful to its commitment to the health and wellbeing of our neighbors and community when our way of life came crashing to a halt. Our church has since been confronted with very real challenges.

The demands we face call for new commitments, new directions, new collaborations. Insurance companies, FEMA, town officials, fire codes, remediation requirements, grant writing, emergency funding, zoning restrictions, building codes, contracting, and engineering, all had to be addressed in a timely and consistent manner. Weekly staff meetings confronted complex problems with determination and competing demands with prioritization. Through it all, our leadership sustained a confident spirit and genuine faith. Our focus is directed to positive outcomes and innovative thinking. The vote taken on April 21st at the *Special Church Meeting* reflects the integrity of our community and is an affirmation of our work over the past 5 months.

We now are to reestablish our missions before we consider returning to worship in our sanctuary. This twostep process demonstrates what our community values most. We envision our mission of feeding those with food insecurity, offering direction to the aimless and lost, and supporting those overwhelmed by crisis as our priority. We will be reopening the top floor of our existing building, creatively using our limited space to reestablish the Dinner Bell, Food Pantry, and our self-help groups. This will demand a clearer understanding of how available space will be used, a flexibility in how different groups collaboratively support each other, and a commitment to rethinking what church is and how it must operate.

We have already seen how the Conway Village community is responding. *The American Legion Post 46* Fish Fry was a great success and yielded solid financial support. *Tuckerman's Brewery* is dedicating a Sunday, June 9th event to raising restoration funds, while a joint effort with the *Historical Society* and *Robert Frost School* is being planned. Musicians and bands are asking if they can help raise money for our recovery as well.

The faith in our church, and the community's response to it, is inspiring! Hebrews 11:1 says, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for", meaning people of faith are meant to live with "confident expectation", that inspires them to work for a future reality. We are in a faithful time when people are living through events which will positively reshape their lives and clearly impact the lives of people around them. Our "Year of Challenges" continues. Someone recently asked, "Do you think God is testing you?" to which I replied, "I think God is calling us together ... to a new and exciting future!"

Welcome June!

The Trustees continue to meet once a month, but a lot of work is done in between meetings. In May, we met with the Masonic Lodge #87. They are in need of space for their monthly meetings and would like to use the church. They know the current status of the church, and will wait for us to get the work done to re-open.

We thank those who have kept up with their pledges, it helps to keep the bills paid. Our utility bills are down of course and we plan to begin working on 2024-2025 budgets and will add in the anticipated utility expenses once all the systems are up and running and the building is open. We do hope a new heating system will be much more economical. PLEASE save the date, we plan to have another Special



Meeting after church on **Sunday**, **July 21st**. At that time, we will review the proposed budget and bring you up to date on the work needed to re-open.

We all agree that we need to get the Food Pantry and Dinner Bell back up and running. It is unlikely that the old pantry space can be used for anything but storage for now. The temporary plan will be to have the pantry in Fellowship Hall. In order to use the building, the church will need to get an occupancy permit from the town. At this time, we do not know what limitations there may be in using the bottom floor. We are hoping to meet with them, along with Bergeron Technical Services, in the near future.

Nancy and Anne met with a FEMA team for the Recovery Scope Meeting. They had representatives addressing Civil Rights (ADA), Environmental (oil spill and historical building), Mitigation (doing work beyond just replacing what was there, ex. the heating system) and NH Homeland Security. Kate from Bergeron Technical Services was with us. (lucky to have her there!)

The team's function is to help us through the application process. They are not the same folks who are working with the town regarding Flood Plain zones, re-occupying flooded spaces etc. Kate noted that we will need to meet with town in the near future.

Next steps:

FEMA site inspection week of May 28th

Weekly call in meetings start first week of June.

Bergeron still working on plan to re-open

Nancy, Anne and Shawn Bergeron, will meet with the town to discuss what is needed for an Occupancy Permit. We also need to discuss mitigation to prevent future flooding.



To be awakened by the awesome power of the Lord.


In so many ways we really were spared And the work will continue 'till all is repaired. It's going to take time—so we all must abide, So much to be done—God will provide.



The Monadnock Congregational Church Welcomes a Settled Pastor





A Pastoral Letter from your Conference Ministers

April 4, 2024

To all Authorized Ministers and Churches of the New Hampshire Conference:

Even as we celebrate the promise of resurrection joy in this season, we want to acknowledge and speak to what is a tender moment for some in our midst. In the past ten months, we have had two of our active pastors pass into God's eternal care. Last May, *Susan Garafalo*, who served the United Church of Winchester, passed away. At the beginning of Holy Week last week, *Maureen Adams*, who pastored both Third Congregational Church in Alstead and the United Church of Acworth, passed. Both deaths were unexpected. As a matter of fact, both of these faithful servants were preparing liturgy for upcoming worship services earlier in the mornings in which they died. We continue to encourage our New Hampshire Conference covenant community to hold Susan and Maureen's families, friends, and the communities they served in prayer.

But our letter is more than an invitation for prayer. It is a call for sacred care-taking.

Before our further comments, and with all good caution, we want to state clearly that we by no means are trying to imply any causal relation in Maureen and Susan's specific situations. We do not know enough to make any comment about Maureen and Susan's care for themselves. We do know the communities they served loved them dearly and did their very best to affirm and support their ministries.

Yet, we know and want to acknowledge that the demands and stresses of professional ministry are high in this generation. This is true whether one serves in a local church or another ministry setting. If we do not remain vigilantly aware of this reality and seek to counter it with a great depth of care-taking, the costs can run deep. And those costs are felt by many – our Authorized Ministers and those who love them, all the ministry settings being served, and by all who seek to walk together as Christ's Church.

Authorized Ministers, our plea to you this day is to *really* take care of yourselves. Caring for the sacred spark within others requires caring for the sacredness of yourself first. Take your days off and use all your vacation time. If you miss time off, make it up as quickly as possible. Nurture your spiritual, emotional, intellectual and physical self regularly. Develop resources of support around yourself whether through a Pastoral Leadership Development Group or through a self-created collegial gathering. Be ready to say "no" when you have nothing left to give. There are times when others will try to convince you that the well-being of the church rests solely on your shoulders. That is a mantle none of us can carry. The only way the church moves forward is if we do this together (and with a whole lot of God's grace).

Leaders in our churches, you have a role in this too. Make sure the appropriate groups in your church (Pastoral Relations or Human Resources Committee) have regular conversations with your pastor about utilizing all their available days off and vacation time. This is necessary for both the congregation's and the pastor's well-being. Set aside some additional funds so that your pastor can engage in spiritual direction or counseling. Set mutual and realistic expectations with your pastor and communicate them with the rest of the congregation so that everyone is investing in the same expectations. Teach your congregation to be flexible when demands on your pastor's time and energies are high. It can be a gift of grace to congregation and pastor alike for there to be occasional Sundays with a lay preacher or a hymn sing. Regularly practice affirmations of all members and be sure to include your pastor. Affirmations can be restorative to the soul. In short, please show the same care to your pastor that they show to all of you.

We know there is a role for us in this too. If there are ways in which we can support this sacred task of care-taking, please let us know. The health of our Authorized Ministers and of our congregations is dear to us.
