A **Celebration of Life** was held for **Mary (McLellan) Chesley** on Saturday, April 26th, 2025. The family brought her "**Certificate of Promotion**" showing that **Mary Elvira McLellan** had successfully

finished the Cradle Roll and progressed to the Primary Sunday School on June 13, 1937, listing her birth date as May 1, 1933. An arrangement of flowers on the altar sported a ball of pink yarn (*with knitting needles*) as a symbol of her being manager of the *White Mountain Woolens Store* in North Conway for 25 years, during which time she met Ron Howard the actor, a story she told many times.

Neighbors, friends, and family members, as well as a worker from her assisted living facility, rose to reflect on Mary's life and personality. A Eulogy was offered

based on Mary's favorite psalms and scripture, often used when she received communion in the final





years of her life. A special address was offered to her great-granddaughter, Maren, who was in attendance. Mary's passionate life and ferocious love of the Boston Red Sox were dully noted. It was a sharing of our sadness of farewell while joining ourselves in common prayers of devotion. We honored her life, gave thanks to those she loved and for those who loved her. It was an occasion of joy, peace, and gratitude for the Brown Church's oldest and longest living member as we shared in the Good News of Jesus Christ.

"Lord, now let your servant depart in peace, your

word has been fulfilled; my eyes have seen your salvation which you have prepared in the sight of all people." (Luke 2:29) was offered as the final commendation for Mary's life of service, determination, and dedication.

Council Chronicles

May Council Meeting Report

The Conway Village Church Council convened on May 6, 2025, combining Trustees and Council Meetings due to time constraints.

Financial Report:

Duddie reported our current cash flow is healthy, however, it was bolstered by a \$6,000 transfer from our investment account to cover recent payables. The Easter offering raised \$6,278, designated for HVAC Splits in the Fellowship Hall for air conditioning and supplemental heating. We anticipate FEMA reimbursement for 75% of our recent flood repair expenses in the coming months.

Trustees - Building Issues:

- Fellowship Hall experienced heating issues on May 4th due to a faulty circulator pump, promptly replaced under warranty by Gaynor, with a service charge from Eastern.
- Interstate Fire replaced the fire suppression system tank and all fire extinguishers.
- Basement Ace installed new dehumidifiers in the crawl space.
- Delivery of a new refrigerator and freezer for the pantry and Dinner Bell, is scheduled for May 9th, with DW Electric adding electrical outlets and a breaker on May 12th.
- Quotes received for resurfacing kitchen cabinet doors range from \$4,700 to \$5,000. Consideration
 is being given to DIY painting or possibly engaging Kiwanis for this project.
 (Dinner Bell will follow up)
- We plan to rehire last year's lawn mowing service provider. Melody will meet with him.
- John noted we should look into adding a heat exchanger for the kitchen.

Spring Clean-up Projects:

Volunteers are needed for various tasks including garden upkeep, general exterior cleaning, and specific room clean-outs and preparations. Please contact the office to volunteer.

Building Use:

Lifeline requested use of Fellowship Hall all day on September 18th or 23rd, the 23rd conflicts with apple delivery and apple crisp production plans. Melody will reach out to Lifeline to reschedule.

Diaconate/Worship:

- Katherine Rhoda is scheduled to play for worship services on 7/20, 9/28, and 10/19.
- No Zoom service on June 8th due to out-of-town commitments of both Steve G. (conference) and Nancy I. (reunion). Alternatives for worship music are under consideration.
- Support and prayers are being offered by Union Congregational Church, York Beach, Maine, following our flood-related challenges.

Mondays are the busiest, picking up food donations from Wal-Mart, Shaws &





TRUSTEE

It might seem early to be talking about the Fryeburg Fair, but preparations are already underway for this important annual event. The fair is our church's biggest annual fundraising

effort, and it takes a great deal of planning and behind-the-scenes work

throughout the year to make it all come together.

This time of year, we're busy inventorying supplies, making repairs or improvements to the booth-trailer, placing orders for ingredients, paper products, booth supplies, coordinating with the orchards, and planning the volunteer schedule. Between apple peeling, baking, and working in the booth, we need to fill 315 volunteer shifts — totaling about 1,276 hours. That's a big list, and in recent years it's become more difficult to find enough volunteers to cover everything.

Some of our dedicated members end up working nearly every day during both the apple peeling and the fair, often covering double shifts to help keep things running smoothly. If you've volunteered before, thank

you! If you're planning to help again this year, we encourage you to invite a friend or two to join — every extra set of hands makes a big difference.

We typically peel 80 bushels of apples to make over 700 pans of apple crisp. Apple peeling will begin on Tuesday, September 23rd, with two shifts each day (morning: 8:30 AM-Noon and evening: 4:30-7:00 PM), continuing daily — except Sunday — through Thursday, October 2nd.



This year, the Fryeburg Fair opens a day earlier, beginning Saturday, September 27th, and running through Sunday, October 5th. The fair requires all booths to be open from 7 AM to 9 PM daily. Carl will once again faithfully handle the early morning restocking run and work the 7–11 AM shift solo. The remaining day is covered in two shifts: 11 AM–4 PM and 4 PM–9 PM (often wrapping up closer to 9:30 PM with cleaning and closing).

Sign-up sheets — both online and in print — will be available soon. Please consider how you might be able to help. With everyone pitching in, we're looking forward to another successful fair season!

Theological Evaluation of C.S. Lewis'


The Four Loves

A special program examining the theology of C.S. Lewis and his book, "<u>The Four Loves</u>" was held on Friday mornings in March and April. The program began with a review of his personal and professional life.

C.S. Lewis was drafted for two World Wars, one as a soldier in the trenches and one as an author to write talks for people hunkered down in "*the Tubes*" (subways of London) as German bombs fell overhead. His first tour of service led to him becoming an atheist; he later converted to the Christian faith becoming an Anglo-Catholic.

C.S. Lewis was also famous for writing mythological treatments for children on war, heroism, faith, and endurance, through the books known as "<u>The Chronicles of Narnia</u>". C.S. Lewis married a divorced Jewish woman, Joy Davidman, caring for her through the last stages of cancer. He later wrote a book, "<u>A Grief Observed</u>" which became a standard for understanding intense grief.

Our study examined Lewis' framework of the differences between "*likes*" and "*loves*", Affectionate Love (*storge* in Greek), Friendship Love (*philia* in Greek), Erotic Love (*eros* in Greek) and finally Charity (*agape* in Greek). The evaluation showed people "loved the program" (*excuse the pun!*) and asked we consider another study in theology this Fall. The book was not an "*easy read*" but was deeply appreciated.



The eight men who participated in the class requested that we pick a theologian from America for our next study, as the literary references Lewis used, while common to the English culture, were difficult to follow. Our evaluation showed that there was ample time and opportunity for everyone to share their points of view, ask for clarification of the readings, and to have their questions heard and addressed. The Men's Bible Study affirmed our 8 a.m. meeting time.

I want to thank the Church for purchasing the books used in the study, for those who provided fruits and pastries, and for the fresh coffee served. It was impressive how seriously the group took to the study and how faithfully they attended.



Please join us anytime you can. We have a space just for you!




